- Acceptable items include leaves, shrubbery and weeds
- Grass clippings are not accepted.
- Do not overfill bags

TAKE EXTRA CAUTION WHEN USING **FIRE OUTDOORS**

Central York Fire Services (CYFS) asks residents to use extra caution when using fire outdoors, especially during hot and dry conditions.

Follow these fire safety tips to keep flames under control:

- Fires are not allowed between 11 p.m. and 8 a.m.
- Don't have a fire when it's windy
- Never leave a fire unattended
- Fire must be at least 4 metres (13 feet) from your home, lot line, trees, fences, vehicles, overhead wires or any other combustible material
- Keep the fire small no more than 0.75 metres (30 inches) in diameter and 1 metre (40 inches) in height, including the flame height
- Keep a garden hose close by and ready
